Condor Gold continues an internal Covid-19 prevention protocol with our employees, which includes sanitary measurements within our sites and in the surrounding communities, such as:

- Masks are obligatory
- Clean vehicles outside after use
- Alcohol spray for all the desks.
- Disinfectant booth is used at the entrance for all persons who enter the offices.
- Shoe disinfection container has been installed at the entrances of the offices.
- Face Mask protection
- Temperature monitoring

As of November 2020, Condor Gold regained normal activities, all employees working full time, but with sanitary measurements and social distancing being implemented to avoid spreading of Covid-19 and to ensure the safety and health of our employees and surrounding communities.

## **Executive summary**

The following report covers the period from January to March 2021, including the environment, social, health and safety and human resources areas.

Condor continues to implement its Environmental and Social Management System, which includes Environment, Community, Health and Safety and Human Resources. Activities were restarted in November with sanitary measurements and social distancing in place.

Environmental work was focused on monitoring of weather parameters, groundwater and surface water level monitoring, presentation of the water quality results from December 2020, water management, waste management and recycling, maintenance of the tree nursery "Oro Verde", maintenance of four reforestation areas located in Los Rastrojos, Nance Dulce and ALPHA 6, all located in La India concession, and Soledad de la Cruz, located in Real de la Cruz concession, environmental awareness activities with workers and community, fire control due to forest fires in the company's properties, INAFOR permits, support to government institutions for different environmental campaigns and coordination of the Water Project and training in use of the purification plant.

Other activities included delivery of the environmental quarterly reports to government institutions, baseline study progress on site wide water balance ("SWWB"), follow up on the kinetic study for ARD, coordination of the water project, final report of the forestry inventory in the three projects, environmental supervision during drilling campaign.

The tree nursery "Oro Verde" holds a total of a total of 5,848 plants which were watered, fertilised and cleared of weeds and pests as part of the maintenance program of the tree nursery Oro Verde. 467 plants were added to the tree nursery, 15 plants were donated to INAFOR-Santa Rosa del Peñón in March.

The social area continues to work on maintaining the social licence with the villages neighboring the mining project through various relationship programs and various communication strategies with stakeholders.

The company's social investment has focused on social programs: Contributions and Donations, addressing issues related to education, health, sports, village mourning; during this period, 43 contributions were delivered to individuals and organizations. Agua Fresca program benefited 404 families from Santa Cruz de la India, Agua Fría village and 26 property owners. Seniors program has 96 members; APROSAIC, that works with the villages neighboring the project; Agua es Vida program, with 160 members; Businesses program, with 80 entrepreneurs; Youth en Acción program, which benefitted 26 young people; and Happy Childhood, which benefitted 36 children. For this quarter, focus was mainly on supporting village health in Covid-19 prevention activities.

The company continues to support training and capacity building of its employees, providing financing and scholarships for English courses, and Masters programs .

## 1. INTRODUCTION

This report is part of Condor Gold’s commitment to continuous improvement and monitoring of the implementation of its Environmental and Social Management System (ESMS) in the areas of Environment, Social and Community Relations and Human Resources; ensuring transparency with its shareholders and relevant stakeholders.

## 2. OBJECTIVE

To inform stakeholders about the implementation of the Environmental and Social Management System in the areas of Environment, Social and Community Relations, and Human Resources during the first quarter of 2021.

## 3. ENVIRONMENTAL ACTIVITIES

### 3.1. ENVIRONMENTAL MONITORING

#### 3.1.1. Baseline studies

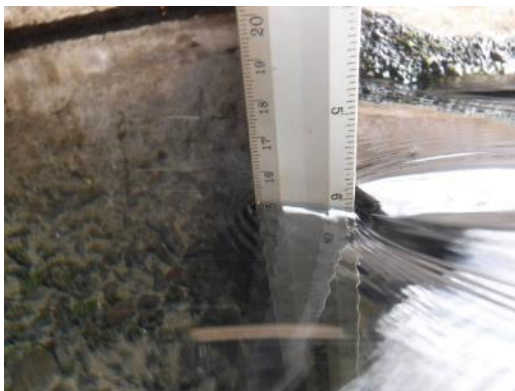
Condor Gold continues conducting groundwater level and surface water flow monitoring, as well as gathering weather data from its digital weather station and three rain gauges (La India, Agua Fría and La Mestiza locations).

As part of the geotechnical studies, 14 piezometers were added to the groundwater level monitoring program.

##### 3.1.1.1. *Surface waterflow*

Monitoring of weirs continues. Constant water flow is only present in San Lucas V-notch weir (LIWR001).

In January, water level in San Lucas weir was 14.7cm, 1.8 cm lower than December 2020. However, water level reached 15.1cm by March 2021. The other weirs continued to be dried due to the dry season (Photos 3.1.1.1. a-e).

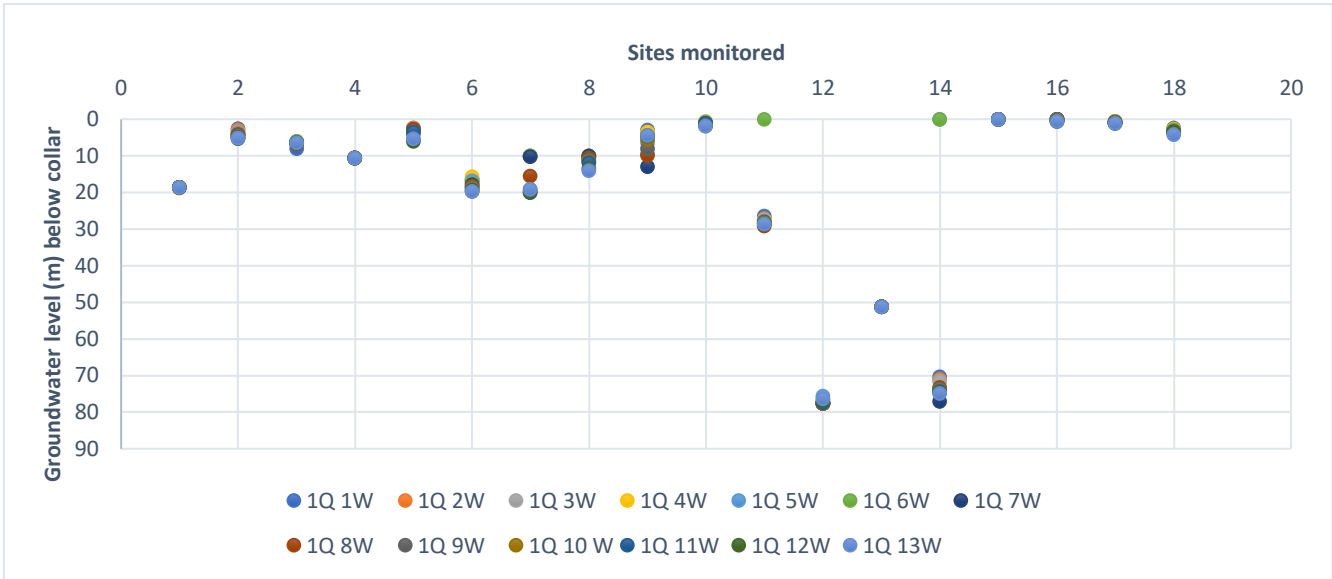

Further to the surface water monitoring, Condor is preparing a SWWB study overseen by SRK and TGI consultants to develop a hydrology model and continue studies for final designs of Tailings Storage Facility (“TSF”) and water dam area.

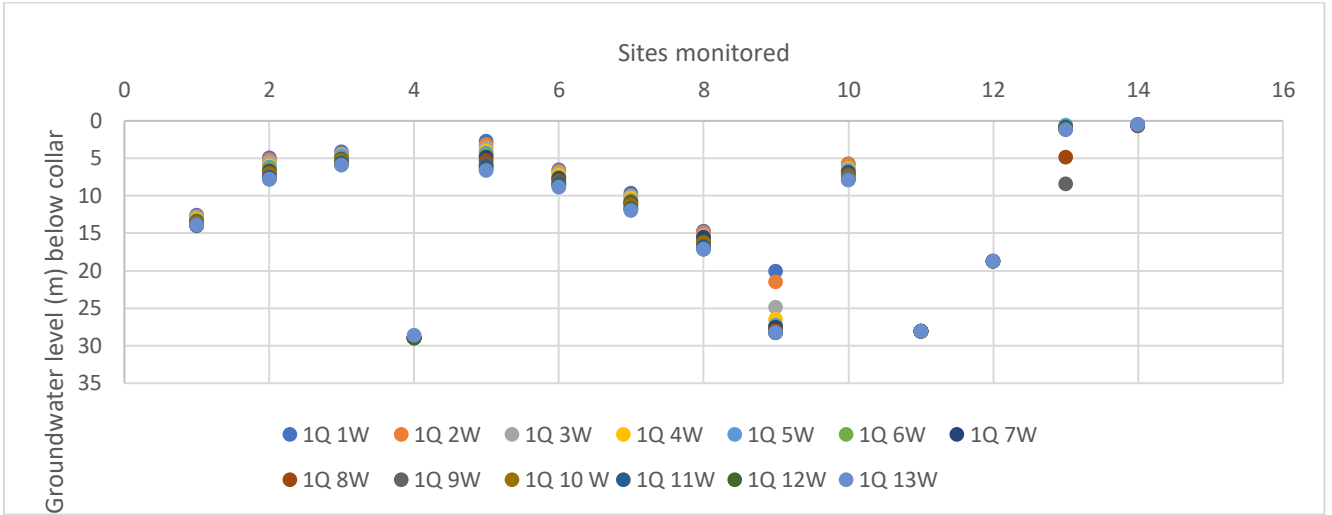
### **3.1.1.2. Groundwater level monitoring**

In total, 33 sites are being monitored: 19 sites continued to be monitored this month as part of the systematic monitoring divided in 14 hand-dug wells and 5 drilled wells. And 14 sites with new piezometers located in the geotechnical drill holes conducted in the TSF area and the water dam for final designs.

Weekly groundwater level for 19 sites, data from 1Q 2021 is shown below:

Furthermore, Condor is working on a more detailed hydrogeology studies overseen by SRK Consulting (UK).

**3.1.1.3. Weather data**

During the quarter, Condor continued registering data from the weather station and three rain gauges located in Agua Fría village, La India village in La India concession and one in Espinito-Mendoza concession.

Based on Condor’s weather station, the following data was registered during this quarter:

The rain gauges did not register rainfall during the three months reported.

#### 3.1.1.4. Acid Rock Drainage kinetic study

The consultant delivered the final document of the ARD kinetic study. Below is a summary of the conclusions of this study:

- pH values ranged between 6.9 - 7.5 (neutral or circumneutral pH) and trace concentrations of potentially toxic elements in the natural leachates, measured during the first flush and the measurements of the field parameters during 1.5 months of rain that the drill cores were exposed to, indicate that the rock types do not have potential for the generation of acid rock drainage.
- The pH values measured in the laboratory in the samples of the first wash of natural leachates registered pH values that vary between 6.9 - 7.15 pH for Tatiana, between 7.0-7.3 pH for America, and between 7.2-7.5 pH for La India project, suggests that there is no ARD and therefore in this pH scenario there are no conditions for the leaching of metals and metalloids (As, Ba, Be, Cd, Co, Cu, Cr, Mn, Hg, Ag, Pb). At these pH levels the metals and metalloids are not soluble.

The study will continue as scheduled in the rainy season, taking samples of the leachates and analyzing the results.

## 3.2. ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT

Condor continues implementing its Environmental and Social Management System, in compliance with internal policies and international standards. Activities in the environmental area continued under sanitary measurements. 5-minute talks are given to workers divided by areas, washing hands and use of masks is implemented within the company's facilities and social distancing continues to be implemented.

Activities this month included monitoring of weather parameters, groundwater and surface water level monitoring, water management, waste management and recycling, maintenance of the tree nursery “Oro Verde”, maintenance of four reforestation areas located in Los Rastrojos, Nance Dulce and ALPHA 6, all located in La India concession, and Soledad de la Cruz, located in Real de la Cruz concession, environmental awareness activities with workers and community, fire control due to forest fires in the company’s properties, INAFOR permits, support to other areas, support to government institutions for different environmental campaigns and coordination of the Water Project and training of the purification plant.

Support was also provided to the social team participating as judge in a drawing contest “Mining and Environment” with elementary schools from Agua Fría, La India, El Bordo, El Carrizal, Cristalito and Nance Dulce; activity in the tree nursery and in the Arboretum of El Cristalito village; and with the follow up of the “Medicinal garden” social project as part of the Seniors program.

Support was provided to INAFOR-Santa Rosa del Peñón and MARENA in their forest fire control and biodiversity campaigns respectively. Also, support was given to San Nicolás municipality in El Rodeo concession to celebrate International Womens Day.

Other activities included delivery of the environmental quarterly reports to government institutions, baseline study progress on the SWWB, follow up on the kinetic study for ARD, coordination of the water project, final report of the forestry inventory in the three projects, environmental supervision during drilling campaign.

### **3.2.1. Environmental Management System implementation**

#### **3.2.1.1. Environmental Awareness**

Environmental Awareness activities were limited to meetings organized with five villages to present results of the water quality sampling done in December 2020, which included; daily 5 minute talks with workers and the celebration of two international days: World Water Day and Environmental Education Day.

For this, a cleaning activity was organized in La Mestiza property with co-workers and artisanal miners. At Cacao village school an activity was organized in collaboration with Kluane Drilling. A total of 45 participants were involved in the World Water Day in Cacao village.

### 3.2.1.2. Participatory Water Monitoring Program

The results of the water sampling done in December 2020 were received on 29<sup>th</sup> January.

In March, meetings with five of the seven villages were held to present the results of the water quality sampling done in December 2020. The meetings were held in El Bordo, Cristalito, Agua Fría, Carrizal and Nance Dulce.



Two villages did not have meetings due to Covid-19 preventive measures: La India village received the information delivered to their homes by the social team and the meeting in Ocotillo village was suspended due to a confirmed Covid case within the company.

### 3.2.1.3. Waste management program implementation

Regarding the Waste Management Program, during this quarter, a total of 180 lb were generated as general waste and delivered to the community waste dump; 150 lb of organic waste were sent to the composting area in ALPHA 6; a total of 60 lbs were stored for recycling including bags, paper, cardboard and plastic bottles. In January, a total of 175 lb of recycled material (paper, cardboard, and plastic) were donated to the social program El Agua es Vida, who sold them to NicaGreen.

### 3.2.1.4. Soil protection and biodiversity conservation

As part of the remediation and biodiversity conservation efforts, Condor continues with its tree nursery in La India concession. Also, Condor continues implementing the reforestation plans in 7.13 ha located in Nance Dulce, Soledad de la Cruz and Los Rastrojos villages under agreement with landowners and in Alpha 6, a property of the company. During this quarter, the reforestation plan included maintenance activities such as watering and fertilizing, weed removal and fence repair.

Furthermore, as part of the soil protection program, site inspections were conducted in the areas of drilling campaign, geotechnical drilling, and earthwork for the viewpoints and road access. These inspections are conducted prior, during and at the end of the activities to ensure that environmental measurements are implemented, and negative impacts are prevented or minimized. The areas are then remediated and rehabilitated to ensure soil conservation, reduce potential erosion process and sedimentation of rivers.

#### **3.2.1.4.1. Fire control brigade – environmental workers**

The environmental workers have been dealing with fire control activities. A fire control brigade was activated within the group and they covered a total of four fires on the 25<sup>th</sup>, 27<sup>th</sup>, 28<sup>th</sup> and 29<sup>th</sup> March.



In total, 11 Mz (7.7 Ha) were affected. These kind of events are frequent during the dry season, since it is a common culture among farmers to burn the land before planting season begins. The company has participated and organized campaigns several times in coordination with INAFOR (forestry institution) and continually supports INAFOR on this matter. However, workers require better protective equipment for this activity and further training.

### 3.2.2. Tree Nursery “Oro Verde”

The tree nursery “Oro Verde” provides the trees for all reforestation areas in the Condor concessions. By the end of this quarter, a total of 5,848 plants were watered, fertilized and clean from weeds and pests as part of the maintenance program of the tree nursery Oro Verde. 467 plants were added to the tree nursery, 15 plants were donated to INAFOR-Santa Rosa del Peñón in March.

### 3.2.3. Implementation of reforestation plans and activities

#### 3.2.3.1. La India concession – reforestation activities

Maintenance of reforestation areas in Nance Dulce, Los Rastrojos, and ALPHA 6 continued. This included fertilising, watering, and pest control. In the area of Alpha 6, watering is done through a drip system.

Activities in the reforestation areas included cleaning, fertilising, watering, pest control.

### 3.2.3.2. Real de la Cruz concession – reforestation activites

Maintenance of the reforestation area located in Soledad de la Cruz village continued. This included, weed removal, fertilizing, installation of plastic bottles as irrigation system and repairs of 262.5 meters of fence and road repairs.

### 3.3. OTHER ACTIVITIES

#### 3.3.1. Water Project for La India and Agua Fría villages

The construction and electrical work was completed. The equipment for washing, filling, and sealing of the water drums was received, and a training workshop was conducted with 10 participants. The training focused on the functioning of the purification plant and 3 candidates for the operator's job position participated, as well as the selected company workers.



The Environmental Authorization was received from the Ministry of Environment. The application for the permit of the National Water Authority is underway. The hydrogeology study for this application was completed with hydrogeological consultants.



## **4. SOCIAL ACTIVITIES**

### **4.1. STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT IMPLEMENTATION**

#### ***4.1.1. Meetings with local stakeholders***

During this quarter, the company held more than 20 meetings with the leaders of the social programs to coordinate the activities carried out with the members of the programs and the village in general.

#### ***4.1.2. Bilateral meetings with local stakeholders***

##### ***Bilateral meetings***

During this period, the company held 9 bilateral meetings, with local organizations in the Area of Direct Influence (ADI) and with NGOs and/or institutions interested in collaborating with social programs.

#### ***4.1.3. Communication campaign***

During the quarter, the communication strategy continued to be executed using various methodologies such as: house-to-house visits, meetings with leaders of the boards of directors of social programs, use of Facebook, YouTube and the Company's website. With the use of these communication channels, we were able to be in direct contact with the population and disseminate our work.

### **4.2. COMMUNITY RELATIONS PLAN IMPLEMENTATION**

LA INDIA GOLD developed a social investment plan oriented to generate conditions to promote better village relations in the areas of direct and indirect influence of the project; with a focus on water, communication, support for small mining, among other contributions and programs.

During the quarter, the investment was **US \$ 51,322.00** in the following items:

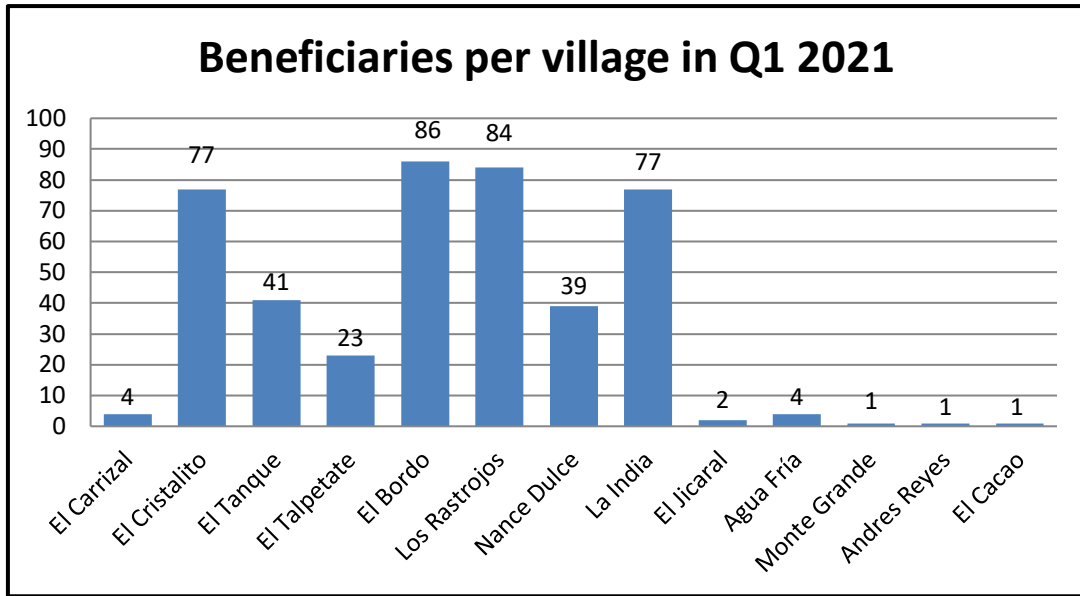

### **Fresh Water Program in the Santa Cruz of La India community**

During the first quarter 2021, the weekly water delivery program continued to be developed, the delivery of two free canisters and two subsidized canisters in the month were maintained, directly benefiting 404 households in the Santa Cruz de la India and Agua Fría villages. These villages are directly affected by the Mina La India project.

Support was also provided to vulnerable sectors: seniors, people with disabilities and multi-household families through the free delivery of four water canisters. With this, we reduce water shortages and intestinal diseases, providing residents quality water for their consumption.

In the Santa Cruz de la India village, 2,500 cannisters of fresh water have been delivered in this period.

#### **Activities within the water program:**

- 274 families continue to receive their canisters of water on a weekly basis.
- 274 families received recommendations on cleaning bottle and dispenser to prevent infections.
- 5 institutions receiving water canister weekly.

- Information was given on preventive measures against the Coronavirus during the delivery of bottles through flyers and delivery of a prevention kit against Coronavirus.
- Dispensers were delivered to new beneficiaries enrolled in the program.
- Delivery of flyers to beneficiaries from Agua Fresca program in Santa Cruz de La India village on the types of masks authorized by World Health Organization (WHO) to prevent the new surge of the pandemic.
- Delivery of quarterly magazine "La Voz de La India" to Santa Cruz de La India's Agua Fresca program's beneficiaries.
- Beginning of the contest "The cleanest house" by Agua es Vida program among members in Santa Cruz de La India.
- Beneficiaries of the program are commemorated on Women's Day with a present.

#### **Agua Fría village**

- The fresh water program reaches every home in Agua Fría village, also permanently benefiting families where there are older adults and people with disabilities.
- 863 cannisters of purified water have been delivered to the village in the first quarter of 2021.

- 129 families received recommendations on cleaning the bottle and dispenser for virus prevention.
- 1 institution receives it weekly.
- Information was given on preventive measures against the Coronavirus during the delivery of water through flyers and the delivery of a prevention kit.
- Dispensers were delivered to new beneficiaries enrolled in the program.
- Delivery of flyers to beneficiaries of the Agua Fresca program in the Agua Fría village related to types of masks authorized by the World Health Organization (WHO) to prevent the rebound of the pandemic.
- Delivery of the quarterly magazine "La Voz de La India" to beneficiaries of the Agua Fresca program in Agua Fría.
- Beneficiaries of the program commemorated the Women's International Day with the delivery of a present.

### **Business Program**

Santa Cruz de la India local business program's board of directors, with the support of Project Mina la India during the 1st quarter of 2021, began sensitising business owners to implement hygiene and prevention measures to reduce the spread of Covid 19. The work is supervised 02 times a month to review compliance with the extraction agreement.

#### Santa Cruz de la India's Seniors Program

During the 1st quarter of 2021, the Board of Directors of the Seniors' program began promoting hygiene and prevention measures to prevent the spread of covid19, a pandemic that continues to affect the world and especially the most vulnerable sector, the seniors.

The activities are continued from house to house and mainly focused on health. As part of the activities, patients were visited to deliver food packages, all members were visited to sensitize them and continue taking care of themselves and implementing their hygiene measures, each one was given a health kit.

A visit was also made to update registration forms and verify the expiration of identity cards.

The self-sustaining projects Huerto Medicinal and Piñatas, worked actively during the 1st quarter.
