Condor Gold has developed an internal prevention protocol with our employees, which includes sanitary measurements within the installations and towards the surrounding communities, such as:

- Talks given and written pamphlets on sanitary measurements and COVID-19 prevention were distributed to employees.
- Avoid social gatherings as much as possible and promote social distancing in common areas.
- Use of masks for employees is obligatory in the installations and villages.
- Cleaning outside and inside of vehicles after each use.
- Alcohol spray (small) is distributed for all employees and for desk/computer cleaning.
- Benzalkonium chloride is distributed for all the employees to use in their houses to clean surfaces.
- Disinfectant booth, washing hands, shoe disinfection and thermometers are used at the entrance of the offices.
- Suppliers are met outside the office areas to reduce contact with employees.
- Guidelines for kitchen area and cleaning procedures have been modified and the use of common items has been eliminated.
- Villagers in the social programs and local schools have received talks, as well as sanitary supplies (alcohol, chlorine, etc).

As of November 2020, Condor Gold regained normal activities, all employees working full time, but with sanitary measurements and social distancing and sanitary measurements being implemented to avoid spreading of Covid-19 and ensure the safety and health of its employees and surrounding communities.

## I. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Condor continues to implement its Environmental and Social Management System, which includes Environment, Community, Health and Safety and Human Resources. Activities were resumed in November with sanitary measurements and social distancing in place.

Environmental work focused on monitoring of groundwater and surface water level, monitoring of weather parameters, water management, waste management and recycling, maintenance of the tree nursery “Oro Verde” and maintenance of 8 reforestation areas located in La India and 2 in Real de la Cruz concessions. Implementation of the Participatory Water Monitoring Program including water quality sampling in La India, America, and Tatiana projects. Daily 5-minute talks to environmental workers until August, support to administrative area; environmental awareness activities with co-workers and Institutions of the state, support to León Zoo as part of the biodiversity program were also undertaken.

Other activities included delivery of the environmental quarterly reports to government institutions, baseline studies advanced on SWWB with final draft level design, follow up on the kinetic study for ARD, river sediment sampling, coordination of the water project and its environmental application process, A forest inventory was carried out in the garbage area donated to the Municipality of Santa Rosa el Peñón, obtaining permits for cutting trees issued by INAFOR for the Mina La India and Tajo Tatiana project, as well as a permit from INAFOR for the use of 3 chainsaws, Execution of the tree cutting plan in the plant and office sector of the Mina la India mining project.

The tree nursery “Oro Verde” holds a total of 6,419 plants, which are watered, fertilized, and kept clear of weeds and pests as part of its maintenance program. Activities in the reforestation areas included cleaning, fertilizing, watering and pest control. A total of 637 trees were used to plant in the reforestation area of Nance Dulce and Real de la Cruz concession.

The social team continues to work on maintaining the social license with the communities neighboring the mining project through various relationship programs and various communication actions with stakeholders.

The company's social investment has focused on social programs: Contributions and Donations, addressing issues related *inter alia* to education, health, sports, community mourning; during this period, 57 contributions were delivered to individuals and organizations. Agua Fresca program benefits 460 families from Santa Cruz de la India, Agua Fría village and 26 property owners. Seniors program has 85 members; APROSAIC, works with the communities neighboring the project; Agua es Vida program, which has 135 members; Businesses program, with 52 entrepreneurs; Youth in Action program, which benefits 21 youth; and Happy Childhood, which benefits 40 children.

The company continues to support training and capacity building of its employees, providing financing and scholarships for English courses, and Masters programs.

## **II. INTRODUCTION**

This report is part of Condor Gold's commitment to continuous improvement and monitoring of the implementation of its Environmental and Social Management System (ESMS) in the areas of Environment, Social and Community Relations and Human Resources, ensuring transparency with its shareholders and relevant stakeholders.

## **III. OBJECTIVE**

To inform stakeholders about the implementation of the Environmental and Social Management System in the areas of Environment, Social and Community Relations, and Human Resources during the third quarter of 2022.

## **IV. IMPLEMENTATION OF THE ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT SYSTEM.**

### **LA INDIA CONCESSION**

#### **a. ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT**

This technical report contains the main activities carried out by both the hydrological component and the environmental area during the third quarter of the current year. These activities are executed according to the obligations contracted by the company through environmental permits acquired according to the corresponding stage (Exploration, construction, and/or production), this to generate information prior to or during each of the phases mentioned. and demonstrate the current situation of the different variables involved as a prelude to guaranteeing healthy practices during the development of the project.

In the context of generating information and reporting it both internally and to the governing institutions of the environmental legal framework at the local level, the information is presented at the level of the concession area in accordance with the requirements established by the current permits and their regulatory framework.

#### **b. ADMINISTRATION AND PERMITS.**

##### **i. Municipal landfill project.**

- Meeting of the LIGSA technical team with representatives from Santa Rosa municipal mayor's office to review, update and change the information generated. To date LIGSA has completed its phase of review and finalization of documents so that the mayor's office initiates legalization and relocation procedure.
- In October, a meeting will be scheduled to present the final documentation to the mayor's office and make a settlement of commitments by the company.

**ii. Quarterly reports to government institutions.**

- In July, quarterly reports were delivered to the corresponding institutions, as part of the commitments acquired in concession and environmental permits.

**c. Environmental permit.**

- Donation of 3,472 plants was made to MARENA in the framework of compliance with the delivery of 200,000 plants established in EIA for reforestation.

**d. Special permissions.**

- Coordination of delivery of woody material
- Attention to INAFOR inspection for the revalidation of special permits: La India Pit and TSF.
- Special permits for Tatiana, La India and Tailings Dam (TSF) sector were processed by the forestry regent before INAFOR, currently in the approval process, which will carry on in the first week of October.
- Participation in the Forestry Fair carried out by INAFOR León.

**e. Non-hazardous waste management.**

- 220 pounds of general waste, 355 pounds of organic waste and 60 pounds of recyclable material were produced in the camp areas.

**f. Oro Verde tree nursery.**

- At the end of the quarter there is an inventory of 6,634 plants and 109 under observation as new planting.
- During this period the following maintenance activities were carried out:
  - watering, when needed.
  - Pest control under the application of organic chemicals
  - Application of fertilizer (rooter)
  - Preparation and mixture of organic soil (rice husks and composting)
  - 364 plants were moved into new bags

**g. Maintenance of reforestation areas.**

Currently there are six legal agreements for the implementation of forest areas, these are distributed within the concession a total 6,771 Ha (map in annex), in addition to the plant construction area; the following activities were carried out:

- Manual weed removal
- Cleaning of mechanized undergrowth (use of strimmer)
- Chemical control of weeds
- Making holes and planting 109 plants
- Application of fertilizers.

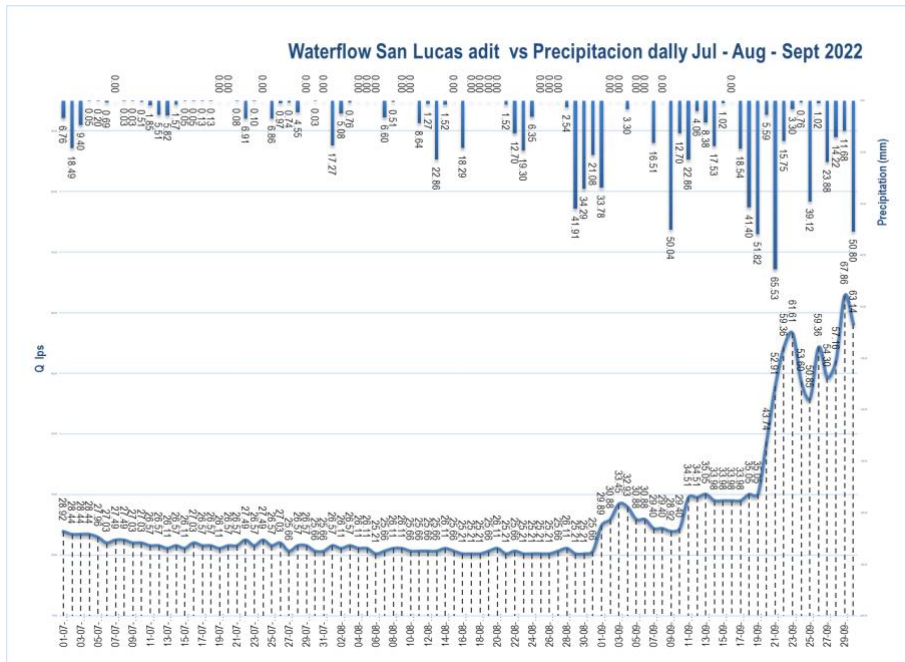
### **Baseline studies**

Condor Gold continues conducting groundwater level and surface water flow monitoring, as well as gathering weather data from its digital weather station and three rain gauges (La India, Agua Fría and La Mestiza locations).

### **Surface water flow**

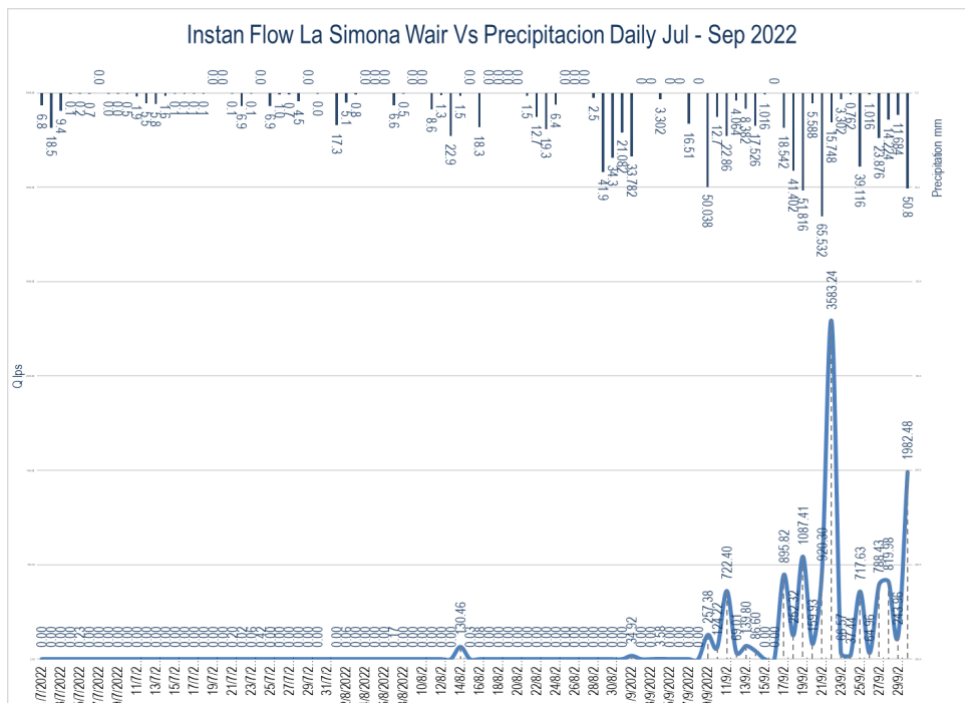
Monitoring of surface water levels continues at 6 different sites within the concession areas of the project, 5 located in La India sector and 1 in América sector.

For this quarter, continuous flow is registered in San Lucas tunnel located in Ocotillo sector. Likewise, permanent, and instantaneous flows have been presented in La Simona. The flow behavior in both sites and landfills due to rainfall occurred in the project area and the accumulation of groundwater in old La India Mine sector (San Lucas drainage). The variation of flows in San Lucas - Ocotillo landfill for this quarter is in the range of 25 to 67 lps, with an average value of 31.2 lps; the trend is upwards given that we are entering the months with the highest accumulated rainfall for the project area.

Regarding La Simona landfill, the basin began generating instantaneous flows in this monitoring site as of May, registering a maximum value of 3,583 lps in September and 3 lps as a constant flow during the same month, the following graph shows the behavior of the maximum daily flows in this control site.



Graph 2.5.1.b Comparative behavior of water levels and precipitation in Landfill La Simona.

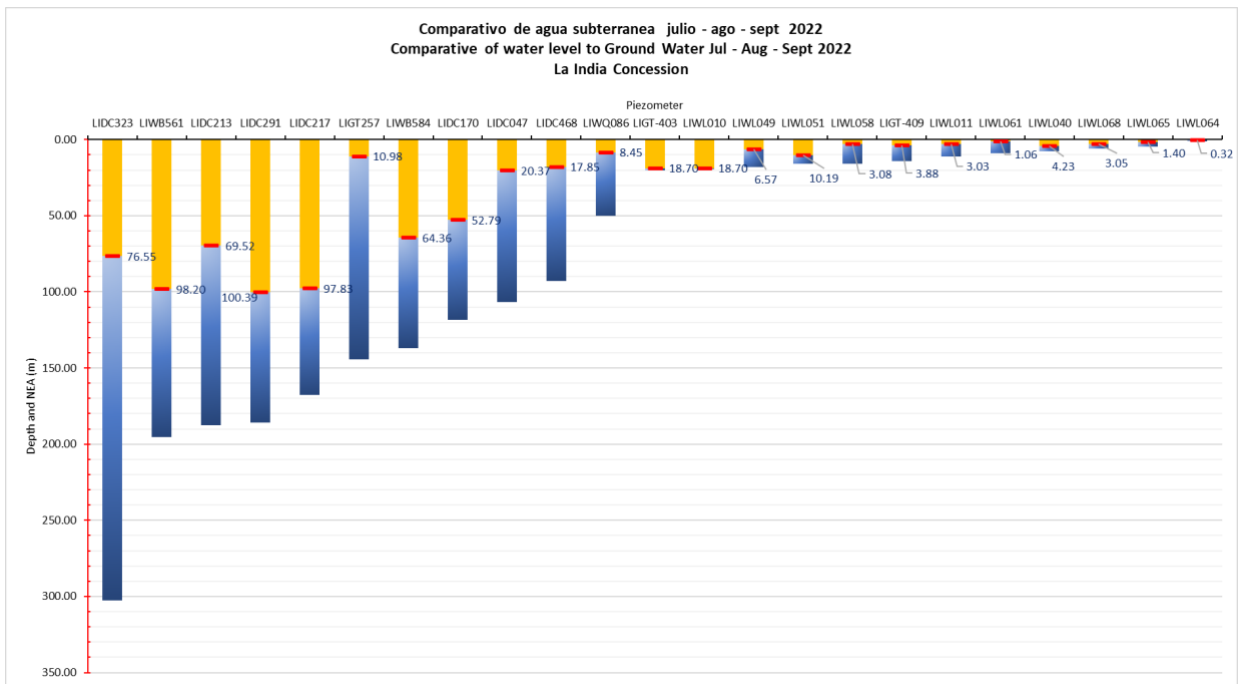
**J. Groundwater level monitoring**

LIGSA performs weekly continuous monitoring of groundwater levels in 24 wells / piezometers distributed within its main concession areas.

The variation of static water levels in the current network fluctuates according to its location with respect to the geomorphology and depth of the wells whose range is between 1 and 398 m, and whose water levels for this quarter are located in the range of 10 to 132 m, with average values in the range of 42 m deep for deep drilled wells, in the case of intermediate wells the range is between 2.3 and 6.9 m with an average value of 14 m and 1.51 m for excavated wells.

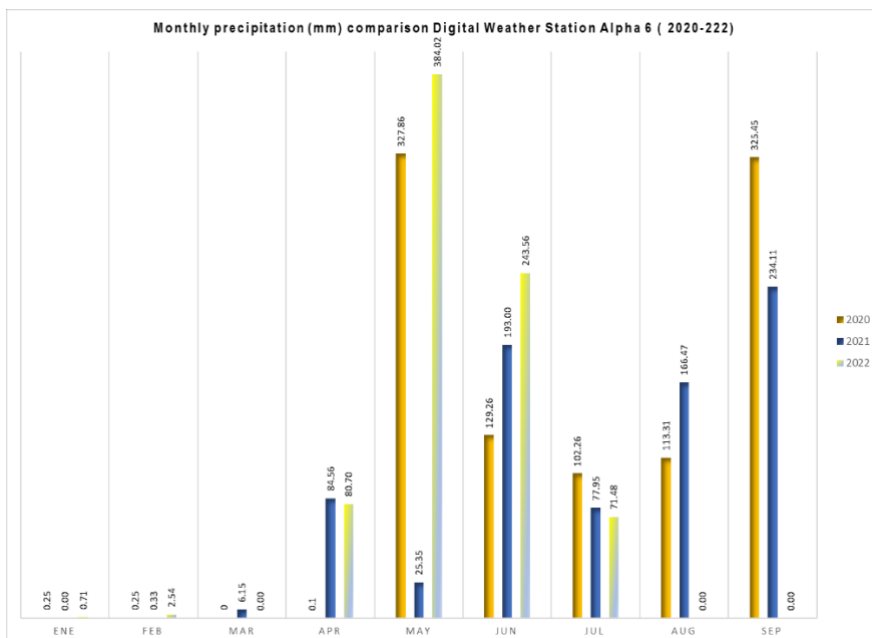

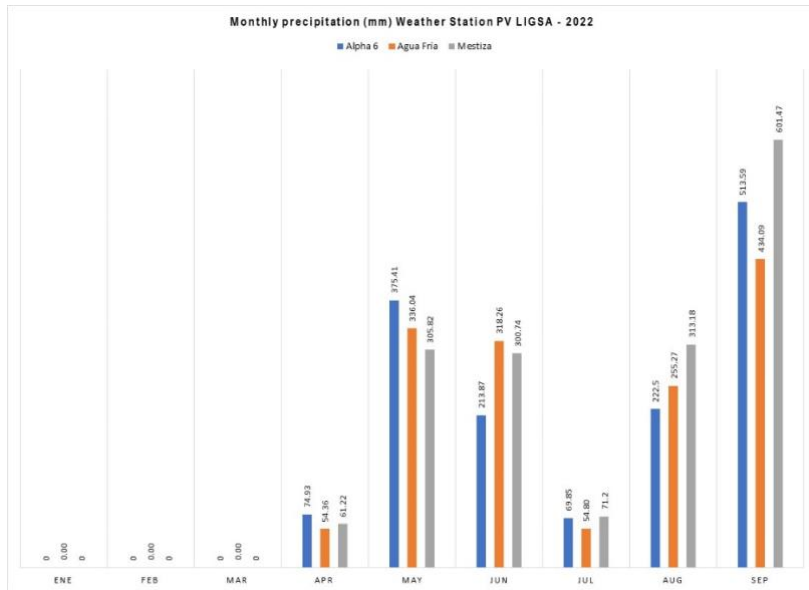
The digital station went out of service due to damage to data decoding components caused by a storm in August, the company expects to restore the station in the fourth quarter of the year when replacement components are received.

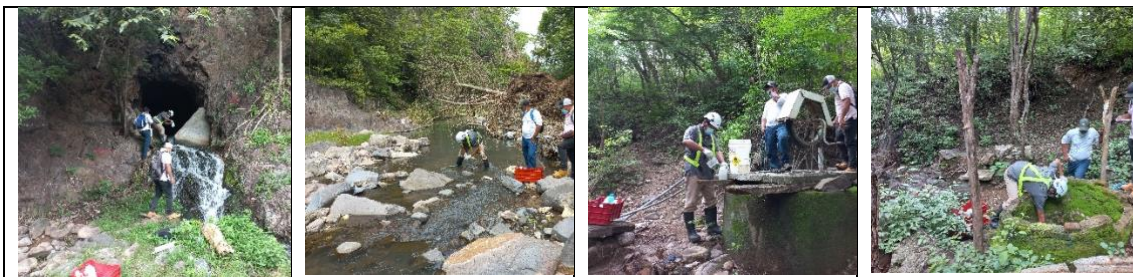

**L. Water Quality – Systematic Monitoring.**

- First sampling of 2022 carried out on July 5th and 6th at 11 baseline sites.
- The results of the first sampling scheduled for 2022, in the general context in the 11 sites that correspond to La India, the same historical conditions of water quality are maintained, where the existence of traces of Cyanide below the permissible limit prevails (0.05 mg/l) and natural arsenic (0.001 mg/l)

**M. Acid Rock Drainage kinetic study**

LIGSA performs weekly inspections of the volumes of leachate for each reactor arranged in its study area.

In each reactor, the measurement of physical parameters of leached water quality is carried out.

The collection of leachate samples corresponding to June and July accumulations were carried out, they are preserved under refrigeration for future shipment to laboratory analysis at the end of the year.

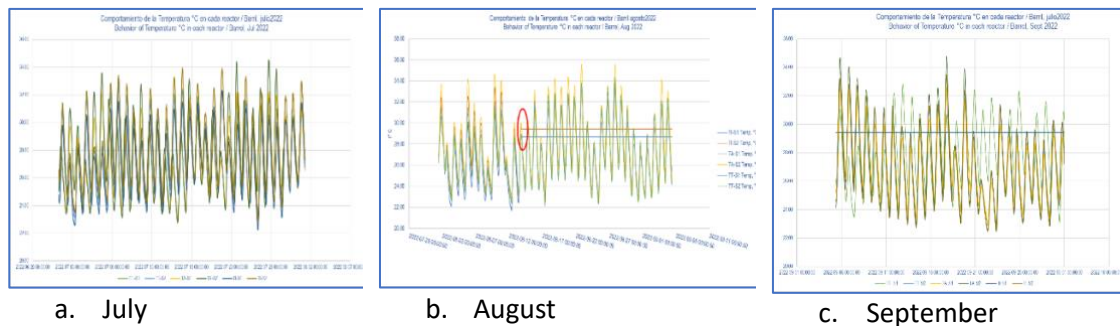


**Pictures 2.6.1:** measurement of physical parameters of water quality, collection, and storage of leachate volume.

For the present quarter, the temperature in each reactor was established in the range of 22 to 36°C, with an average value of 27.6°C. These values relate to the leaching process - during the states of composition and decomposition of minerals- that may occur in the rock samples contained in each reactor. This information will be obtained by analyzing leached water quality in the laboratory, The following graph shows the behavior of the temperature for each reactor.

### **N. Potable Water Project La India – Agua Fría**

LIGSA is part of the inter-institutional commission that carries out the formulation of the water project for La India and Agua Fría. The company, through the hydrology area, works jointly with technicians from the Mayor's Office of Santa Rosa del Peñón, the National Water Authority (ANA), the Social Investment Fund (FISE) and ENACAL in the process of generating technical and

baseline information to be used in the formulation of the project. The feasibility study is 95% complete.

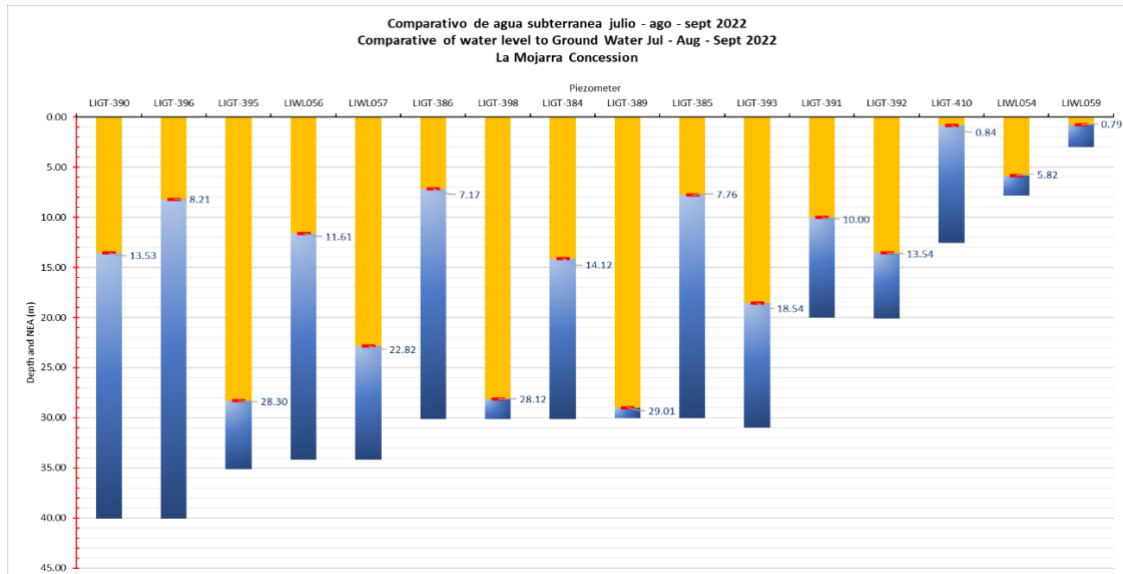
- LIGSA performs weekly continuous monitoring of groundwater levels in 16 wells / piezometers distributed within its main concession areas.

- The variation of static water levels in the current network fluctuates according to its location with respect to the geomorphology and depth of the wells whose range is between 3 to 40 m, and whose water levels for this quarter are in the range of 0.84 to 29 m, with average values in the range of 15 m depth for drilled wells and 0.79 to 5.8 m for excavated wells with an average depth of 3.3 m.

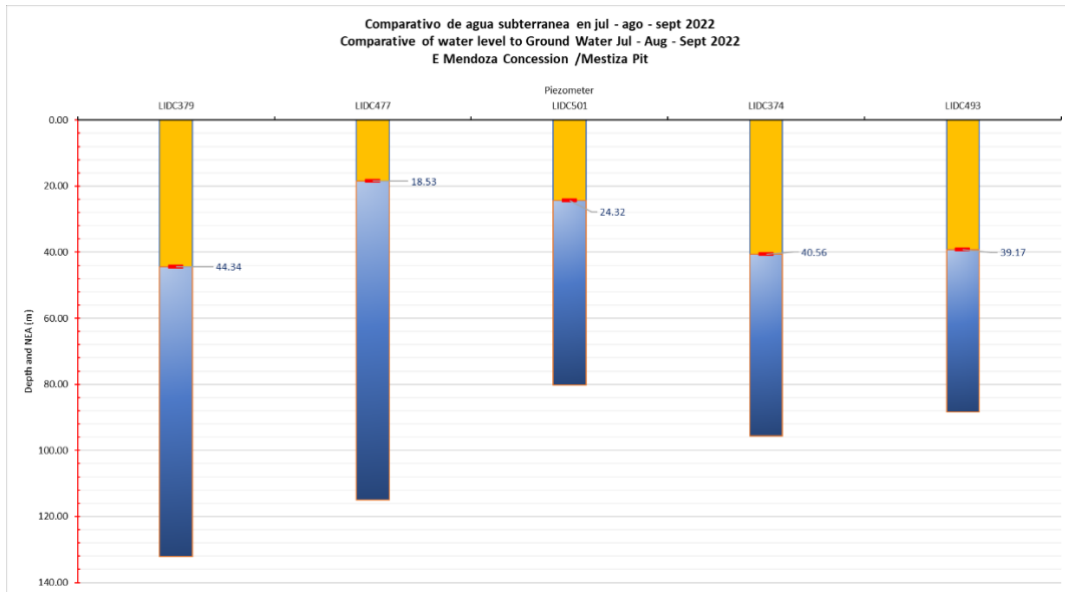

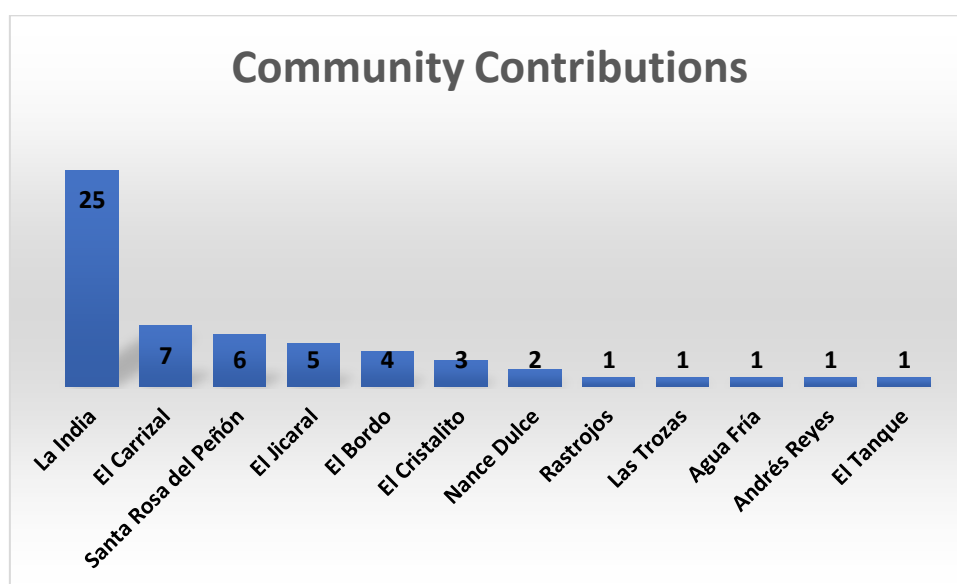

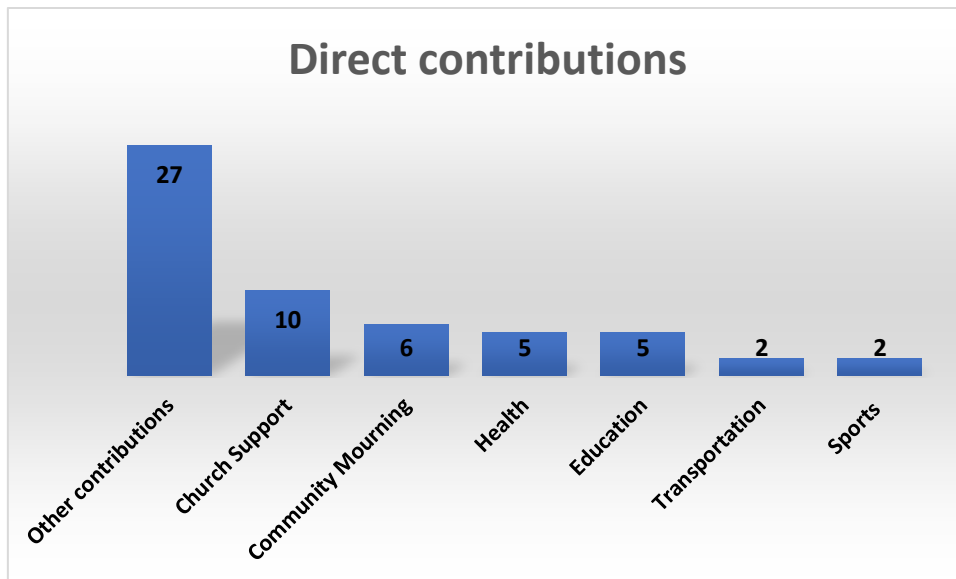

Condor Gold continues to benefit the families of Mina la India and Agua Fria through the Agua Fresca program, guaranteeing drinking water for 460 families.

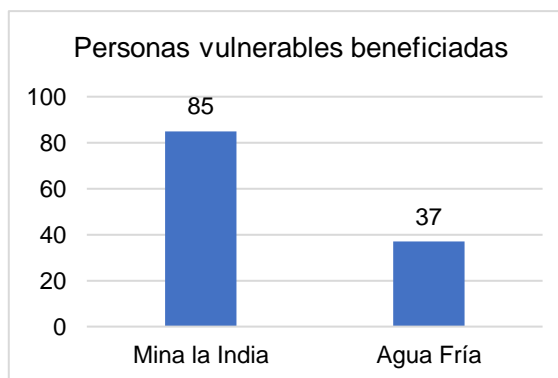
In 373 households they receive the benefit, representing 460 families, 82 multi-household families and 5 institutions.

The program benefits 120 households with vulnerable family members (seniors, people with disabilities).

#### **Activities within the water program:**

- Delivery of two bottles weekly to 460 families.
- 5 institutions received the bottle of water weekly (educational centers, health post, churches).

- As part of the relationship, they were invited to pick up the bottle that is delivered to the central point.
- The beneficiaries received a message about the importance of water consumption for health.
- Relationship visits to beneficiaries of the program, they were invited to take care of their health to avoid diseases during the winter season.
- Support to the health post with bottles of water in a day of attention with specialists in Mina la India.
- Upon receipt of application letters for admission to the program, two new families from Mina la India entered the program.

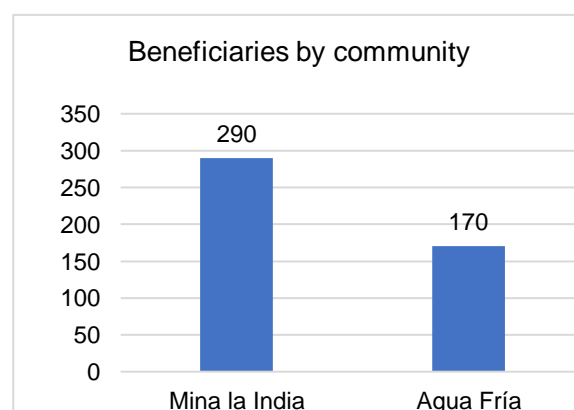

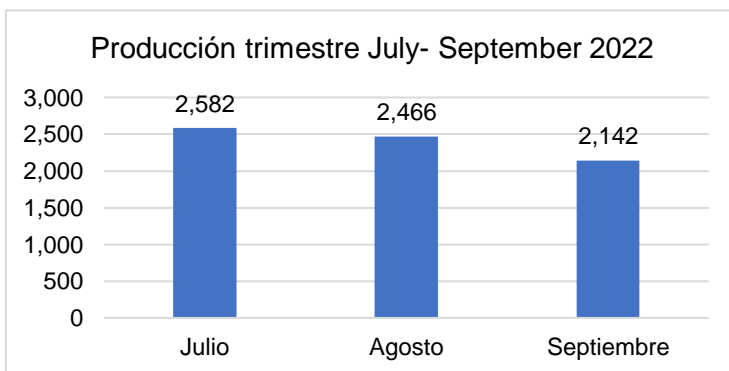
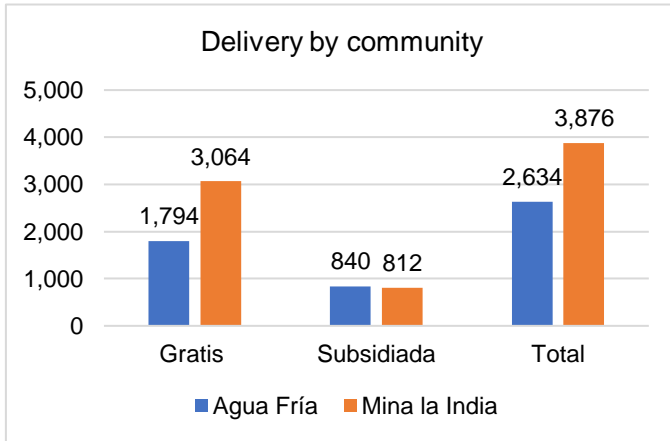

The Business program was founded in December 2017 and begins working in the community from 2018, with a six-member board of directors, elected by the same members and currently consists of three.

The company's initiative is to work for the economic development of the community, together with local businesses in all areas that are required. Putting a technician as coordinator for such execution.

Currently 52 business owners are enrolled in the program, with them the axes of financial education and training are worked: with 3 self-sustainable projects:

- **Community savings.** 23 members do it through bank accounts; Members of the Board of Directors pass through their homes twice a month, to collect the fees they are going to deposit; Later they leave a voucher, and 13 members save through piggy banks; for a total of 36 in this project.
- **Santa Cruz de La India Communal Bank.** It has 24 partners who started with community savings and now put their money in common fund, to rent the money between them, with low monthly interest rate.
- **Rental of communal rooms.** There are 4 homeowners trained for this activity. Between them they have a total of 6 rooms and 10 beds. Guests can be sent by the same company or someone who visits the community for some reason outside the company and that they consider appropriate to provide the service.

The company through the business program continues to generate development opportunities for all.

**APROSAIC**

APROSAIC is a program that promotes and manages the economic, social and cultural development of communities surrounding the mining project, which with the support of CONDOR GOLD-Mina La India and the collaboration of community leaders, actions are carried out that contribute to the improvement of the quality of life of citizens. Started in September 2017 and for this year its lines of work are: **HEALTH, EDUCATION, CULTURE AND COMMUNITY LEADERSHIP.**

APROSAIC serves 6 communities surrounding the Mining Project. One (1) direct influence and five indirect (5). The program has a board of directors of 3 members, 21 community leaders and 15 health brigades.

**Community leadership:** During the quarter, information was collected in 2 communities, with the purpose of updating housing and family data, also maintaining relationships with families in the communities and promoting the work carried out by the leaders in conjunction with APROSAIC and Condor Gold.

**Health:** Training and workshops were provided to health brigades to strengthen care in base houses.

**Culture:** The Golden Roots dance school continues to strengthen the artistic skills of the 44 students who are part of the school. Outreach was also initiated with parents to promote support and values in their children.

#### INDEPENDENT ARTISANAL MINERS' INVOLVEMENT GROUP

##### **Artisanal mining, activities with board of directors Independent Miners.**

Work continues alongside independent miners who have the benefit of exploiting ore on the company's property, known as La Mestiza. This is permitted if they comply with the regulations and provisions that the company through its artisanal mining equipment enforces in this property.

##### **Activities with group of independent miners (MESTIZA)**

During the third quarter of 2022, the number of 64 artisanal miners organized in 13 groups benefited from a free access agreement to La Mestiza property based on a contract made to carry out artisanal mining work until December 30, 2022.

The production of the third quarter of the groups benefited with the access and extraction agreement was 304.3 tons of ore with an approximate grade of 6.00 gr. Maintaining an average of 101 tons per month, this trimester was the rainiest of the year and there was a hurricane, as a preventive measure they temporarily canceled the extraction activities to avoid accidents, later the artisanal mining team supervised each of the works.

## B. IDENTIFICATION OF VULNERABLE FAMILIES

### 1. Senior Citizens Program.

This program aims to publicize the activities carried out by older adults in the months of April, May and June in the community of India. It currently has 84 members, this trimester there were 3 fatalities reported. The 2022 work axes **are:** Recreation, mental, psychological and physical health and self-sustainable projects.

For this quarter that includes the months of July, August and September, older adults have carried out different activities in coordination with the mining project with the aim of contributing to the mental, psychological and physical health of the elderly.

The elderly of this community of Mina La India in previous years did not have recreational spaces, did not have involvement in social activities, now with the creation of this program they allow acceptance and involvement in social issues.
